# Prelim Pairs Session 2

Several updates were made to the scores for Session One including a hand being erased in the Blue Section. This changed the position of several pairs including changing the first and second placed pairs. In this session we shall follow Sverre and Jan Mikkelsen who were eventually placed first in the previous session and continue with South African pair Craig Gower and Alon Apteker and the visitors from England, Frances Hinden and Graham Osbourne.

We shall start at the beginning—sometimes a very good place to start.

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I suspect a few tables succumbed to ‘pushing’ just too much and when East opened One Spade, West made an overbid of Two Diamonds and then they were doomed to reach 3NT. After a heart lead declarer can only make seven tricks. This was the scenario at Sverre and Jan’s table for a score of 103/37. Our two E/W pairs they were more restrained. Frances and Graham rested in 1NT and since it was played from the West side it did not attract a heart lead and thus declarer had plenty of time to establish his spade suit and make nine tricks for 33/107. Craig and Alon had a more competitive auction when South intervened with a heart bid and overreached to Three Hearts and another ‘Pairs’ double ensued and when the contract failed by two tricks that was 8/132.

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Our Norwegian pair defended against Two Spades and if declarer allowed South into the lead before dealing with trumps then a heart ruff would be taken and a two trick defeat giving N/S 138/2. Against Craig and Alon the opposition got too high with Three Clubs and the defenders took their five tricks: two spades and a ruff, one diamond and the ace of trumps for ninety-nine matchpoints.

This board demonstrates the occasional frustration of Pairs. You do nothing wrong, the opponents do nothing exceptional, but reach par and you score less than twenty-five per cent. N/S here are cold for 3NT or Five Clubs and it is not overwhelmingly difficult to reach one of those two contracts but about sixty per cent of the field failed to do so. So a good result for our N/S pair and a bad result for our two E/W pairs.

Our first slam. Easy if played by South but what if played by North, surely a diamond lead breaks the contract, but look closely at the North hand. Do you see the contract winning card in his hand? The eight of spades. On a diamond lead from East, up with the ace, cash the ace and king of spades and ruff a spade and note the fall of the queen and ten, making your eight good for a diamond discard. You also have to find the double dummy play of a first round finesse against the jack of clubs but if you are good enough to bid slams knowing the queen ten of spades are trebleton then that would be a piece of cake.

Another slam hand, better than the previous, all it requires is trumps to break. Only one pair bid it. I suspect the problem was discovering the eleventh heart because Blackwood will tell you that two keycards are missing, even so only one other pair stopped in Five Hearts suggesting that in most cases neither pair thought their hand worthy of a slam try. If West opens One Diamond then North will overcall with One Heart. Hopefully South has a Three Diamond bid in his armoury showing heart support and a diamond control and North with controls in the other three suits can perhaps make a forward going move but I have to admit it it is not the easiest slam to reach.

Yet another fifty per cent slam. Almost impossible to bid and at pairs those fifty-fifty slams are not the best bets. We are often counselled to play the slam in the 4-4 fit and use the 5-4 fit for a discard. In this case Four Hearts does not even make, declarer gets forced and the hand disintegrates for a very sad outcome.

At last a biddable slam, though over a third of the pairs failed to bid it and two pairs actually managed to play in a part-score. Of course the 'seasoned' pairs player chose no-trumps rather than diamonds and scored 93 or 124 matchpoints depending whether the defence led a club or another suit.

At the end of the second session Sverre Johnsen and Jan Mikkelsen were in the lead ahead of Alon Apteker and Craig Gower..

# Prelim Pairs Session 3

The Great Shuffler had been very quiet up till now. He woke up on Sunday morning and turned up the temperature on his dealing machine. Some unusual distributions were the result. One of the first was:

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Par on this hand is Six Diamonds doubled -3. A result that never happened on any of the seventy-one tables. Furthermore had you reached par as East you would have scored just twelve matchpoints and if you had failed by only two tricks because they led a club and thus lost their spade ruff you still would only been worth thirty-seven matchpoints.

I am surprised at how many pairs played in Five Clubs, surely East opened One Diamond and South overcalled in Clubs. What now? A direct Five Diamonds would get my vote but that might lead to North 'sacrificing' in Six Clubs. Half a dozen E/W's managed to find their spade fit and on three occasions bid and made the game

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Another strange one, you have to avoid your 7-2 fit and play in no-trumps, it is the only making game. Four spades fails on the non-trivial defence of two rounds of

trumps and then a club switch. How the bidding went on most tables I have little information but I suspect a few Wests opened a gambling 3NT and were left there.

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North had obviously offended the Great Shuffler and he took his revenge on this hand. If West elected to pass then the bidding was fairly trivial. North opened with his strong bid and if South had a control showing response he showed none otherwise he gave a negative reply and when North discovered an aceless hand opposite settled for a 'certain' Six Hearts. The lucky ones were not doubled and got just above average.

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Assuming West pre-empts in clubs and South closes the auction with a bid of Three Hearts, what is West to lead? If she wants to get her name in the bulletin she leads the queen of clubs, though of course a spade or a diamond lead also eats the contract. Scanning the results I thought I had found such a lead, but on closer examination the Bridgemate record shows a lead of the queen of clubs. It was an obvious error as E/W were playing the contract in clubs. South is in the inenviable position where all the finesses work but just cannot get to dummy to take them.
