

Pre-empts




With both sides vulnerable, and you to open. What is your choice?

1 pair opened 5, 1 pair 4, 1 pair 3, and 1 pair 1.

It is interesting to see how each action worked out.



In the Bernstein vs Foaden match, the full-blooded 5 • opening worked well when South led the A • and continued. North decided to play a third round of hearts which was not successful when East ruffed high, drew trumps and threw away her club loser. It looks better to hope that declarer does not have 2 aces for her pre-empt and switch to a club. In the other room, the correct defence was found when North switched to a club after winning the first 2 heart tricks.



In the Hewitt versus Nestoridis match, in the 1st room East elected to open 4 which was passed round to North who made a strange bid of 4NT indicating 2 places to play. Why strange? With only 9 high card points it looks unusual to commit to the 5 level particularly if partner prefers Hearts. If you are going to bid, it looks like a better bet to bid 4 and hope that partner has some support. Even more strange was South's decision to bid only 5 . If partner is willing to go to 5 level, surely there must be some play for slam. 5 was the limit of the hand. I can only say 'well done'.

In the other room, we see the opposite evaluation of the North hand. Here the 3• pre-empt worked very well making 9 tricks. North decided with only 9 high card points that game was unlikely. Why didn't South bid over 3•? N/S were playing a convention called non-leaping Michaels and 4* would have shown at least 5-5 in Clubs and a major. Maybe South should have made a takeout double over 3•.

Double or Overcall



Not vul vs vul, your right-hand opponent opens 1. Do you overcall 1. or make a takeout double?

Overcalling 1 • has the advantage that if opponents compete in diamonds (which you expect) you can then make a

takeout double. This gets across your 5-card major and if the bidding permits,

you will be able to show support for the other suits. It is more likely that partner has 3 Hearts than 4 or more spades. If you double first and opponents compete in diamonds, you will have to double again and may miss your 5-3 fit.



Only 1 player doubled and this gave her partner a problem with the adjacent hand when the next hand passed. She elected to pass the double. This did not paralyze declarer who wrapped up 1DX with 2 vulnerable overtricks to score +540.

To pass a 1 level contract in this position, you need to have an excellent holding in opponent's suit (diamonds), preferably with no holes. For example, QJ109XX would be a suitable holding. The above hand should take its medicine and bid $1 \checkmark$.



Penalty Doubles of Partscores

2 pairs came a cropper when they disobeyed a very important principle. Always bid to the limit in your own suit before doubling opponents in their suit. In the first auction, West's double of South's pass or correct 2♥ bid showed hearts. When North corrected to 2♠, East decided to double when she should have bid

some number of hearts. In the second auction, East doubled 3♠ when it should have been clear to bid 4♥. Spade contracts made 9 tricks with loss of many imps when East/West could make 4♥.



On the same hand, Peta Balderson and Jenny Gautschi got to 5 ◆ doubled as E/W. South must have been licking her lips seeing that she has 3 tricks in her own hand and partner has opened the bidding. Can you blame her for not leading the A♣? It was fatal as declarer ended up losing only 2 diamond

tricks. East's club was discarded on the hearts when South had to follow to 3 rounds of that suit.

Roz Bernstein and Sharon Lang were the only pair to stay out of this poor 3NT contract. Yes, West has a very good 9 count with a 5-card suit opposite a strong NT, but if partner does not have 3 hearts, game is unlikely to be a good bet unless partner is maximum. All the other pairs transferred to hearts and then bid 3NT which could not make. I think Roz judged well especially as this was a non-vulnerable game. It was worth 6 imps to her side when she made 8 tricks.
