Now some good news for everyone! The **SABF** will be retaining their **membership fees at R250** for 2025. As almost everything else has gone up in South Africa I am sure this is welcome news for all. Remember this amount is for a whole year . . . And payable please in January. When you think just what R250 can buy you these days it is for nothing!

I am so happy to report that face to face bridge is very much alive and well in South Africa! I have included news from as many regions as I knew about in this Newsletter, and even if events are being held with less numbers than before Covid, they are generally well attended and all reports speak of a happy playing atmosphere and a good day out. In a casual conversation with Rob Stephens it seems that all the bridge playing countries in the world have battled since Covid hit and their sessions too are smaller. An average of 8 - 10 tables for a club seems the norm now. The Links Saturday afternoon turnout attracts 3 or 4 sections (8 or 9 or 10 tables for a section) and I know the main club in Cape Town has worked hard to have two large playing sections.

I cannot finish without paying tribute to the many folk who work hard for bridge without any monetary gain for themselves. The SABF Committee members all put in many unpaid hours besides the many folk around the country who organise in clubs just so that bridge can be enjoyed by many. Many people like myself like to think we are giving back to a game which has brought us hours of enjoyment, introduced us to new friends and kept our minds going! *If you have never helped at your local bridge club maybe you can offer to do so.*

16th WORLD BRIDGE GAMES Buenos Aires, Argentina • 22 October - 3 November, 2024* *Registration and Opening Ceremony on 21 October



The South African Bridge Federation held national trials back in April and May to select the Open, Women's and Mixed teams to represent the country at the World Bridge Games, being held in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

The trials format was Pairs, where the top 3 qualifying pairs would make up the respective teams.

The Open Team consists of an experienced lineup of Alon Apteker & Craig Gower, Noah Apteker & Rob Stephens, and Neville Eber & Hennie Fick.

The Women's Team consists of Nicola Bateman & Val Bloom, Diana Balkin & Sharon Izerel, and Dianne Penlington & Glynis Dornon.

The Mixed Team consist of Larry Chemaly & Sharon Lang, Terry & Jan East, and Duncan Keet & Carol Stanton.

Most of the players are expected to depart for Buenos Aires a few days before the 1st match is scheduled to start on the 22nd October, some for the purposes of getting over the minimum jet lag there should be for travelling Westwards, and others for some early sightseeing of Argentina.

The players themselves are responsible for organising their own travels to the Championships, booking their own flights and accommodation. The World Bridge Federation lists recommended hotels to stay

at, mostly for the convenience of the players as they're near the playing venue, but they tend to be on the pricier range of options, so a lot of our players have found cheaper alternativities like Airbnb's and apartments to share.

The opening ceremony is scheduled for the 21st, where all the national teams typically get introduced, and this would normally be followed by a cocktail "party". This usually ends up being a quick snack and drink, and perhaps a short catchup with some of the other international players. Neville Eber usually likes to track down Zia Mahmood as soon as possible to get a shortlist of recommended restaurants to try out over the following week (Zia is apparently more qualified than Google), while Craig Gower and Alon Apteker easily make some light conversations with other top players from around the world.

This is the World Bridge Games (Every 4 years), which is like an Olympic event, where every country in good standing with the WBF is invited to send teams in 4 different categories. The only category the SABF elected not to send was a senior team. Over the last few years, Mixed events have gained popularity, and it seems that Mixed Pairs and Teams events will be promoted and encouraged more going forward.

There are 35 teams in the Open category, arranged into 2 groups of 17 and 18 teams. A EUFA Style draw was conducted to determine the 2 groups, with South Africa being put into group A. A full round robin will be played within this group, with the top 8 teams progressing to the round of 16.

There are 24 teams in the Women's category, in a single group. They will play a full round robin and the top 16 teams will progress to the knockouts.

There are 29 teams in the Mixed category and they too will play a full round robin within a single group. The top 16 again will progress further.

Because of the different number of matches being played in each group, all categories will be on different schedules with the length of matches all being different. The Open will play 16 board matches, the Women 12 board matches and the Mixed 10 board matches.

All these round robin matches will take place over the first 6 days of the tournament, with the round of

16 taking place on the 7th day (28 October). If any teams fail to make the round of 16, then there is a BAM Teams event for this 1 day which they may choose to participate in if they wish.

The 8th day is the start of the 2nd week, which is reserved for the real business end of the main tournament, and includes the Quarter-Final, Semi-Final and Final. Each of these matches are 2 days long!

This is also where the WBF encourages further participation of ANY players from around the world, regardless of level, as a new competition starts in the form of Transnational Open Teams and National Pairs. Any teams eliminated from the 1st week have the option of entering these events free of charge, either with the same teams they played in, or forming completely new and different teams. Often players who didn't qualify for their country in local trials will come along for this 2nd week to experience a World Championship event and get many chances at playing some of the world's best players. Bridge is one of the few sports in the world with this privilege, and many South Africans have done this over the years, with great pleasure being had with these experiences.

CLEARING UP THE CONFUSION BETWEEN FORCING AND NON-FORCING BIDS Submitted by



There is nothing more irritating than having your partner pass what you think is a forcing bid.

Answers

- 1. North may have only 2 clubs if the hand has specifically 4 A 4 V 3 A and 2 A.
- 2. North must have at least 3 clubs (see above to see why).
- North must have at least 5 clubs. A reverse bid (2♦) always promises more cards in the 1st bid suit.
- 4. North must have at least 6 clubs. This bidding is promising 5 hearts and clubs must be longer as he bid them first.
- 5. North must have at least 6 clubs. The hand is not balanced and there is no second suit.
- 6. North must have at least 6 clubs. South is showing at least 9 cards in hearts and diamonds, leaving just 4 cards in the black suits. It would be suicidal to bid clubs with fewer than 6 in this situation.
- 7. North must have at least 6 clubs. The hand is not balanced (would have rebid 2NT with 18-19 balanced) and there is no second suit.
- 8. North must have at least 6 clubs. The hand is not balanced and there is no second suit.
- 9. North may have only 5 clubs here. The hand is not balanced but the second suit may not be biddable as this would be a reverse.
- North must have at least 5 clubs. The hand is not balanced. If the hand's shape was 4 ▲
 1♥ 4 ◆ 4 ♣, North would have been opened 1 ◆.

WESTERN CAPE BRIDGE UNION EXPANDS SCHOOL PROGRAM WITH OVER 400 STUDENTS

The Western Cape Bridge Union is making impressive strides in growing the game of bridge among young learners through its expanding school program. With 16 schools and over 400 students now participating, the initiative aims to introduce bridge to children as young as Grade 3, teaching them critical thinking and cognitive skills through the game. The program has been well-received by schools, with each institution scheduling sessions where learners can be taught by trained bridge coaches.

Western Cape Bridge Union organisers Duncan Keet and Mo De Goede are at the forefront of this initiative. Mo De Goede, who leads grassroots development, has personally engaged with schools in the Bonteheuwel area, working to introduce bridge into their extracurricular activities. The program, which targets primary schools, aims to follow the progression of learners into high school, ensuring continuous engagement with the game. Trained bridge coaches teach students during school hours, with the goal of making bridge accessible to everyone, regardless of background.

The initiative is not just about learning a game—it also serves as a form of job creation. Individuals from local communities are trained and paid to coach bridge in schools, creating opportunities for personal development and income generation.

The school program will culminate in a major event on September 28 at Rosewood Primary School in Bonteheuwel, where more than 200 students will participate in a competition. This event is open to the public, and anyone interested in learning more about the program or supporting the initiative is encouraged to attend.

Western Cape Bridge Union continues to push the boundaries of sports development, using bridge as a tool for cognitive growth, teamwork, and community building. 

THE BRIDGE LOUNGE

It's always quite special when a situation arises which one reads about in the books actually crops up at the table. Have a look at this extremely rare opening lead option.

The Bidding:

1D – It's a good hand but even playing strong twos's I prefer the choice made.

4S – Another good decision. This hand is NOT a two-suiter with such disparity of length and quality in the majors, and with no defence it's vital to pre-empt.

5D – Nothing else really appeals.

5S – Hard to know what the effect of this bid will be, but the spade fit alone makes it worth it.

6D – No room for science, so a practical choice, which must have some play.

The Play:

West led the ace of spades and that was the end of that. The players were about to start the next hand when east pointed out that 6D could have been beaten! 'All' it required was for a brave west to lead a lowish spade, giving east the first trick with the seven. Now a thoughtful defender, on winning the trick, would ask himself what was going on? Why has partner underlead the AKQJ? And the only conclusion to be drawn is that partner was desperate to place you on lead; and with five clubs in dummy and five in hand it could only be a club ruff that partner was seeking.

A further point is that the correct technical lead is the S4, which itself is a suit-preference for the lower outside suit. It takes some guts to do things like this, because on another layout declarer may have the ten of spades, and one ends up looking silly. But here, it would have brought a smile from west, seeing the well thought out choice of lead working out so spectacularly.
